


Miami University Community Hike-A-Thon: Join the Fun

Oxford Community Park Pollinator Garden

A recent AMV project has been a pilot project with the City of Oxford to begin implementation of the city's recently passed Landscape Naturalization Master Plan. Two areas in the Oxford Community Park were converted from turf grass to native plants. One area, near the pool, is now a 900 sq ft pollinator garden and an area near the sand volleyball court is a 1200 sq ft miniprairie. Audubon Miami Valley funded the plants for the pollinator garden and AMV members helped city staff with planting. Signs at the two areas include mention of AMV.


Fall Volunteer Day at Hueston Woods State Park - Volunteers Needed!

Audubon Miami Valley Volunteer Day at the Hueston Woods State Nature Preserve area known as the Big Woods, will be **Saturday, October 28 from 10am to 12:30pm**. Pizza will be provided.

This area of the preserve is designated as a local Important Bird Area (IBA). AMV adopted this IBA as a stewardship project in 2012. These woods are special because they are a small remnant of the mature Beech-Maple Forest that used to cover much of Ohio. The purpose of our work is to protect the diversity of the woodlands from invasive plants that crowd out the beautiful wildflowers that bloom in April, such as Spring beauty, Dutchman's breeches, and Trilliums, the native shrubs and understory trees such as Spicebush and Pawpaw, and the tree seedlings that regenerate the forest. Wildlife of all kinds, including nesting birds and migratory birds depend on this mature woodland habitat.

Volunteers should dress for the weather, and for off-trail work: long pants and athletic shoes or boots - no flip-flops or shorts, please! Gloves and tools will be provided. Please bring your own water bottle. We will be hand-pulling and digging invasive plants in the nature preserve. Honeysuckle and garlic mustard are the biggest offenders.

September 16, 2023 - Indian Creek Farm

Location: 2550 Indian Creek Road, Oxford, OH 45056



Over the past two decades, the <u>Ann Geddes farm</u> on Indian Creek Road has benefitted from restoration projects to improve and diversify wildlife habitats on this unique property. Sam Fitton will lead this hike. Any bird resident to or visiting Butler County is likely to find a favorite habitat niche within this preserve. To assist human access, at least two golf carts will be available at this event. Please bring a personal lunch if you would like to join us for an informal picnic mid-day. October 1, 2023 - Iverson Forest (Indiana)

Location: 2349 Airport Road Centerville, IN, 47330



In 1993, John Iverson, Professor Emeritus of biology, Earlham College, began conserving his 76-acre property, which is adjacent to Earlham's old-growth forest (Wildman Woods) and is a critical part of the largest contiguous tract of forest remaining in Wayne County, Indiana. To date, he has planted over 65,000 trees, created 55 wetlands (two-thirds of them dug by hand), militantly fought the battle against invasives, and permanently protected the entire system with a conservation easement. With limited parking on site, we will meet at Cope Environmental Center's south parking lot at **9:00 am** and car-pool to our destination.

November 18, 2023 - Salamander Run

Salamander Run, a MetroParks of Butler County property, features several hiking trails through a variety of prairie and forest habitats. In the fall, this park is occupied by resident and migratory species that may include Red-tailed Hawk, Pileated Woodpecker, Bluebirds, and Cedar Waxwing. Our outing will be led by Randy Morgan, who has developed a unique familiarity with this park and its birdlife. Meet at the destination at **9:00 am.**

Janet Deardorff is a PhD candidate at Miami University in the Ecology, Evolution, and Environmental Biology program and is in the final year of her PhD studies. She earned her Bachelor of Science at Ohio Northern University in Environmental Science and Field Biology and a masters in Botany at Miami University. During her time at Miami, she has worked under Dave Gorchov and Thomas Crist looking at beaver habitat use at multiple spatial scales in Ohio. Her master's work on beavers' use of Amur honeysuckle spurred her interest to continue throughout her PhD work to study beavers and the plants they eat. Currently, her research focuses on why beavers are using certain habitats in Ohio, as well as beaver and white-tailed deer herbivory interactions on Amur honeysuckle and native woody species in riparian areas.
